We signed our Lease effective July 1, 2024. On two very warm days, much of our collection was moved out of storage. Though challenging work, it was rewarding because we have been reunited with the collection in a more upfront and personal manner. Tables were set up on the former ice surface and every item was examined and the best storage systems were determined.



Our trucks are not yet home, as a new door is needed to accommodate their turning radius and height plus provide a much-needed accessible public entrance.

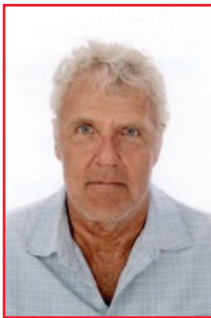
The Museum would like to thank the Municipality of Port Hope for years of free storage, and Hope Towns Initiative for coming to the rescue when we lost storage space in 2023.

TRUCKS ON THE ROAD

On 21 September CFFM accepted an invitation from Napanee to display our 1941 GMC pumper in Market Square for their 170th anniversary of incorporation.

The truck was hauled to Napanee on a trailer and parked with other older and newer fire vehicles. It was marked to represent its 50 years of service in Napanee. It was retired to parade duty in 1976, sold to Farmers Mutual Insurance in 1991 and transferred to CFFM in 2002.

The Museum crew of Chris Terry and Dennis Waddington fielded questions from visitors. Residents were pleased to see a piece of town history on hand. Much appreciation was voiced for the CFFM's efforts to participate in the day and to honour the heritage of the fire department.

A special visitor was retired Deputy Chief Bill Pierson who as a young man had driven the truck as a volunteer fire fighter. Bill shared many tales of his time with the department. A highlight was the recreation of a photograph of Bill taken in the cab of the truck over 50 years ago.

On June 23, 2024, the inaugural Canadian Fire Fighters Museum Charity Run/Walk took Cobourg by storm!

Representing all ages, there were 128 runners (including five virtual and thirteen in Bunker gear). Twelve teams registered including fire and police from Station 17 (Kawartha Lakes), Cobourg Fire, Cobourg Police, Quinte West Station 3, Cramahe Fire, Brighton Fire and Ajax Fire. We had wonderful

A FAMILY REMEMBERS THEIR FATHER WITH A MATCHING GRANT

The Faulkner family is pleased to offer a matching grant for the first \$5000 raised from individuals and families anxious to help establish the new home of the Canadian Fire Fighters' Museum. Challenged accepted!

Charles Faulkner (Chuck) joined the Toronto Fire Department at 19, one of just two new recruits before the start of the Depression. His young wife, oldest daughter and as well as the family of his sister, all of whom depended on him, were very pleased that he had steady work throughout those difficult years.

For more than 20 years, he worked out of Lombard Street, a group that called themselves the Lombardos. One of his favourite tales was about fighting a fire on the roof of the Royal York Hotel on New Year's Eve.

When he made District Chief, he was, at the time, the youngest one ever appointed. He always led from the front and was carried out of more than one fire.

The Museum has already benefitted from the family's donation of Charles's memorabilia, which was on display in the old museum. Terri Pamanter says that when her older sister, Jacci McTavish, died last fall, "it seemed a natural thing to make a memorial contribution to the CFFM as a remembrance of her and our father."

Directors Will Lambert and Dennis Waddington are on hand to accept the \$5000 matching grant from Terri Pamanter on behalf of the Faulkner family.



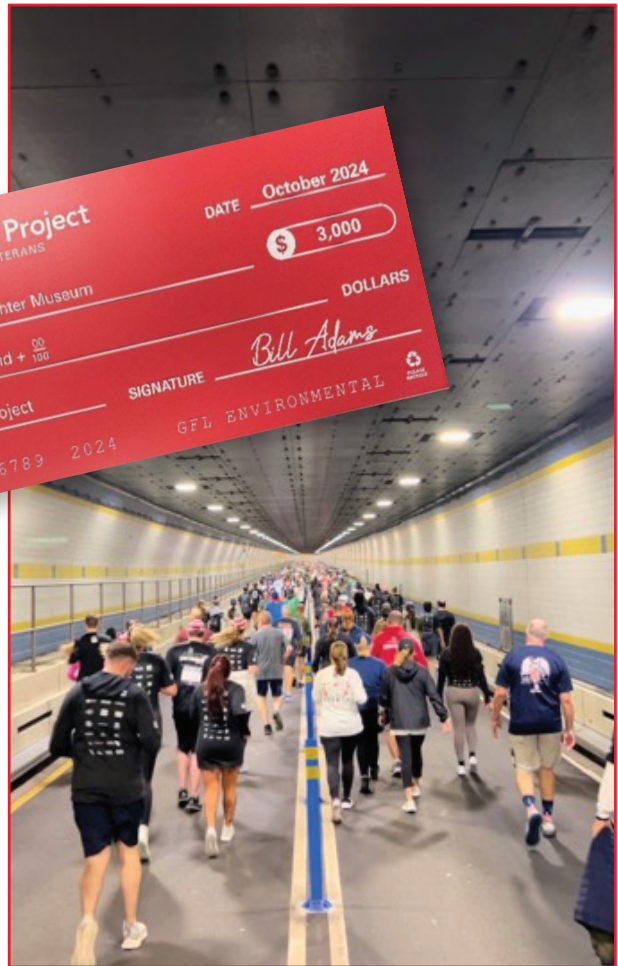
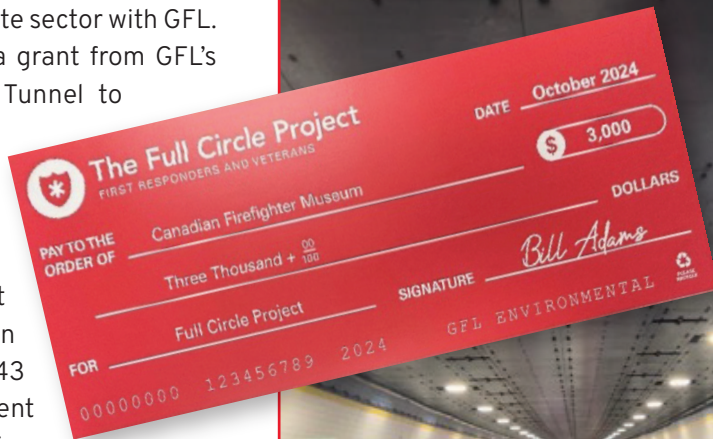
A FIREFIGHTER KEEPS GIVING

When Paul Griffen retired from the Port Hope Fire Department, he shifted to the private sector with GFL. A lifelong runner, he applied for a grant from GFL's Hills of Hope, in support of his Tunnel to Towers Run. It is held in New York City each year on the last Sunday of September.

The event symbolizes Stephen Siller's final footsteps from the foot of the Battery Tunnel to the Twin Towers and pays homage to the 343 FDNY firefighters, law enforcement officers, and thousands of civilians who lost their lives on September 11, 2001.

We had not caught up with Paul by press time, but he sent a picture of the cheque and some of the run. In Paul's words, *"Success this weekend!"*

23 years later, it was still a moving opening ceremony, I could not have been prouder to have been apart of it. It was an honor to assist again with the museum." Paul, the honour is ours and CFFM thanks you, GFL and Hills of Hope.



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
